Methods will include lectures, discussions, in-class and library research and writing projects, and individual assignments and activities.

Course Goals and Learning Outcomes

At the conclusion of this course, you, the legal professional, will be able to:

- 1. Define and describe the scope of family law in the 21st Century, the paralegal's role in family law, and the ethical guidelines paralegals must follow;
- 2. Discuss and evaluate the legal issues and alternatives surrounding traditional marriage, same sex marriage, and Civil Unions;
- 3. Demonstrate, under attorney supervision, the paralegal's role in compiling a family history, with the goal of assisting the attorney in evaluating a potential family law client matter;

- 4. Determine, under attorney supervision, the kinds of premarital and cohabitation agreements that are enforceable in the Illinois courts and draft such agreements;
- 5. Correctly apply Illinois laws governing annulment and divorce to a variety of hypothetical situations and further, to be able to correctly apply Illinois procedural guidelines to the drafting of annulment or divorce documents;
- 6. Describe and discuss Illinois law and procedural guidelines related to issues of parental responsibility and parenting time; draft, under attorney supervision, a variety of documents related to parental responsibility and parenting time; and correctly complete and format related documents that are standard in the 21st Judicial Circuit;
- 7. Correctly research and draft, under attorney supervision, documents related to issues of spousal support, property division, separation, and child support;
- 8. Identify and discuss the tax consequences of both separation and divorce;
- 9. Correctly interpret and assist the attorney with preparation for mediation in child custody proceedings under the Illinois Supreme Court rules;
- 10. Identify the paralegal's role in researching and drafting documentation related to paternity proceedings and adoptions;
- 11. Research and apply a knowledge of legal issues involving women and children to a variety of hypothetical situations and document drafting exercises;
- 12. Discuss the issues of technology in family law, including the medical advances that a court must consider and the tort issues that arise from those medical advances.

Evaluation of Student Performance

Homework that is not clearly labeled and stapled will be returned to the student ungraded.

Students are expected to submit homework on the evening it is due. The final homework grade will be reduced by 10% (1 letter grade) per class period until the homework is submitted. The exception to this rule is if you are absent on the date a homework assignment is due; in that case, the due date is automatically extended to the date you return for your next class without any reduction in points. All homework will be submitted in typewritten format (typewriter or PC acceptable) unless otherwise directed by the instructors. Homework is expected to be written in understandable language using correct grammar and spelling.

The points will be apportioned as follows:

Portfolio. Students are expected to prepare a portfolio that is a compilation of certain documents they have prepared in connection with their class assignments. These are the type of documents that would be prepared and used in a law office under the supervision of an attorney. Some documents are forms for office use, such as an interview sheet and budget, and others are for use in court, such as pleadings and settlement agreements. Samples of the skills that will develop your paralegal competencies include researching statutes and locating online forms (including forms for use in Cook County); drafting petitions for divorce, adoption, guardianship, each with client cover letters; drafting a marital settlement agreement, including property division, child support, and spousal support, with appropriate client cover letter; generating divorce information checklists, including family history and financial information, along with appropriate client cover letters; drafting orders for divorce, adoption, parenting plans and support; drafting a pre-marital information sheet with appropriate cover letters.

Course Policies: Please review these carefully.

You will be allowed a total of three absences for this semester. The Instructor reserves the right to inform you that your successful completion of the class is being jeopardized when you have missed your third class. The Instructor also reserves the right to request that you withdraw from the class with a grade of "W" when you have missed your fourth class. Each absence in excess of three will result in a one letter grade reduction of your final course grade. Class will begin promptly; students are expected to be on time for class and are strongly encouraged to get notes from fellow students if they miss a class.

As is the case in all KCC computing labs and classrooms, no food, drink, or smoking is permitted. Children are also not permitted in the labs.

prohibited. Students are expected to be on time for exams and will not be given additional time to complete an exam due to a late arrival.

It is assumed that all course assignments and examinations represent the student's own efforts. Any impropriety, or appearance of impropriety, will result in a minimum of a "zero" for that assignment/examination and possible removal from the course. In addition, any student found copying software for personal use or altering settings on the computers (beyond the scope of any classroom assignment) will be removed from the course.
