# Course title: THE LAWS OF EVIDENCE, Spring 2018

Credit hours/Length: Lecture hours: 3 Clinical/Lab hours: None

**Catalog description:** This course provides a detailed review of the rules of evidence and emphasizes the role and importance of these rules to any legal action. The course specifically emphasizes how the paralegal assists the attorney in recognizing and identifying admissible evidence and the challenges to admissibility of evidence.

- 1. Discuss the history and development of the laws of evidence;
- 2. Explain the role and importance of the laws of evidence to any legal action;
- 3. Recognize and identify, under attorney supervision, various examples of admissible evidence;
- 4. Identify, under attorney supervision, the challenges to the admissibility of evidence and draft related documents challenging such admissibility for attorney review;
- 5. Examine and explain the role of the witness in the trial process;
- 6. Develop strategies, under attorney supervision, to determine the competency and credibility of the witness and/or to impeach the witness in the trial process;
- 7. Define and describe opinion evidence and demonstrate to an attorney the differences between a lay opinion and an expert opinion;
- 8. Define the hearsay rule and draft appropriate documentation related to the well-recognized exceptions for attorney review;
- 9. Incorporate competency-based learning with practice-based principles.
- 10. Draft motions in limine that demonstrate your practical paralegal skill development for your internship portfolio.

# Homework that is not clearly labeled and stapled will be returned to the student ungraded.

# Course Policies: Please review these carefully.

You will be allowed a total of three absences for this semester. Each absence in excess of three will result in a one letter grade reduction of your final course grade. Class will begin promptly; students are expected to be on time for class and are strongly encouraged to get notes from fellow students if they miss a class.
